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It's mid-August and back-to-school season is approaching! Here are some fun back-to-school statistics from the U.S. Census Bureau and the National Retail Federation.

- Did you know that 2 billion pencils are made each year and the average pencil can write 70 miles!
- Berkshire County employs 7,860 people in education (12.9 percent of the workforce the third-largest sector)
- Berkshire County has 46 public schools and serves 16,215 students
- The average household back-to-school shopping is \$858 for K-12 and \$1,325 for back-to-college.

- 40 percent is spent on clothing; 28 percent on electronics, 23 percent on school supplies and 20 percent on shoes.
- 55 percent shop online, 48 percent in department stores, 47 percent in discount stores, and 41 percent in clothing stores.
- There are 4,688 colleges in the U.S. (Three in Berkshire County)
- 52.1 percent of college students work while in school (20 percent work full time)
- Education pays off: \$87,000 average salary of a person with a bachelor's degree compared to \$47,000 with a high school diploma or equivalent compared to \$38,000 with someone with less than a ninth grade education. Earn more than an extra \$250,000 in your lifetime just by staying in high school and graduating. You can double that by getting an associate's degree.
- Blue was voted the favorite crayon color. What's your favorite color?
